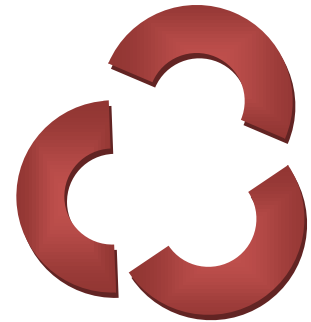

2nd Chance Networking Meeting

Description: The Second Chance Act of 2009 made grant awards to state and local governments, community and faith-based organizations, and federally recognized Indian tribes. The goal is to improve outcomes related to the offender reentry process. The state of Missouri has received several Second Chance Act Grant awards from the U.S. Department of Justice. Come find out how communities across Missouri are using Second Chance Act funding to assist with offender reentry efforts. You may find yourself making connections with organizations in your own backyard.

Pre-Conference Event: Pathway to Change Workshop

Description: The Missouri Department of Corrections has adopted Pathway to Change as its cognitive skills program for the offender population, both in its institutions and under field probation and parole supervision. The 21-lesson PTC curriculum begins with six core lessons followed by six additional lessons. These 12 lessons are taught by departmental staff who have been trained as facilitators in the PTC program. At this MRP Conference you will be provided the opportunity to learn the basic tenets and principles of PTC, and participate in a micro-teaching experience of one of the PTC lessons. Subject-matter topics within PTC include: life maps, values, environmental power, attitude, self-esteem and personality styles of the people we associate with. An underlying foundation of each lesson is a concept of personal mile markers and a discussion of how current behavior is leading toward reentry success or failure (or closer to or away from established personal goals).

Supervision, Evaluation, and Treatment of Sex Offenders:

From Institutions to the Community (Meeting Room 60)

- **Presenters:** *Greg Markway, Ph.D., Chief of Mental Health Services-DOC, Marge Schicker, LCSW, Supervisor of Group-Provident Counseling, St. Louis and Mary Bouman, District Administrator & Supervisor-DOC.*
- **Description:** Sex offender management is a complex system of assessment, treatment, and supervision. Treatment is offered in DOC, as well as through a network of specialized therapists in the community. Probation and Parole officers closely supervise offenders and coordinate with treatment professionals. This presentation will cover institutional and community treatment, assessment, and community supervision. Missouri's Sexually Violent Predator statute and its implications will also be discussed.

The Saint Louis University Prison Program (Meeting Room 61)

- **Presenter:** *Kenneth L. Parker, Director-Saint Louis University Prison Program*
- **Description:** The SLU Prison Program began as a pilot certificate program at the ERDCC, and has grown into an Associate of Arts degree program offering courses for offenders and staff in separate sections. This workshop explores the program and the future of higher education in Missouri DOC.

Crush-Education, Public Awareness Committee-Heroin (Meeting Room 70)

- **Description:** National Council of Alcohol and Drug Abuse –St. Louis will provide an overview of the escalating use of heroin in the Greater St. Louis Area, the changing profile of the averages user and a look at the background story and circumstances that gave rise to this situation. Additionally, he will discuss what the resulting community impact and problems are that arise with this type of drug trend and what the St. Louis community has done or is doing to respond to this epidemic as well as what lessons other Missouri communities facing a similar situation might learn from the St. Louis experience.

Barriers to Employment for the Reentry Population (Meeting Room 60)

- **Presenters:** *Halbert Sullivan, MSW, CEO and Charles Barnes, Director of Employment Services-Fathers' Support Center, St. Louis*
- **Description:** This presentation will provide participants with methods of working effectively with incarcerated and recently released males. The session will also teach tips on structuring a comprehensive method of recruitment and retention of the ex-offender population and assisting them in securing employment opportunities. It will also explore solutions to foster healthy relationships with their families and children while effectively navigating the Child Support Enforcement System.

Employment and Recidivism Workshop & Group Discussion (Meeting Room 60)

- **Presenters:** *Kelly Howery, Academic Teacher and Kelly Peterie-Kissick, Parole Officer II-Chillicothe Correctional Center*
- **Description:** Employment is the number one recidivism risk factor for offenders reentering our communities. There are specific barriers offenders face that have yet to be identified through traditional discussions. As a result, myths, stereotypes, and biases continue to persist in our society. This presentation and workshop will focus on key stakeholder's responsibility in addressing these myths and barriers with offenders and employers.

Engaging Families and Significant Others in the Re-Entry Process (Meeting Room 61)

- **Presenters:** *Denise Collum, Assistant Director-Gateway St. Louis Outpatient and Cynthia Hygrade, Probation and Parole Officer II-Department of Corrections*
- **Description:** This workshop is intended to help community treatment programs who work with consumers involved in the correctional system establish an effective approach to engage families and supportive others in the re-entry process. It will highlight how collaboration between agencies such as Probation & Parole and treatment providers is a critical component to help improve the likelihood of successful re-entry by partnering with families and those significant others who are waiting to greet offenders upon release from prison. The focus will be on teaching participants how to organize and facilitate a group for the sole purpose of educating family members, consumers, and supportive others of the support available through officers and counselors; as well as how to connect with community support once supervision and treatment have been completed.

Prison Rape Elimination Act Workshop (Meeting Room 70)

- **Description:** In Missouri prisons and across the nation, incarcerated individuals are being subjected to sexual abuse. Once virtually ignored by prison officials, offender sexual abuse is now in the spotlight. Being a victim of offender sexual abuse while incarcerated can complicate an already challenging transition process.

- **Description:** Members of the treatment community and law enforcement including the courts, gather with Probation and Parole clients to help them make a clear informed choice about their continued criminal behavior. Clients are "notified" of the efforts of law enforcement and the courts to keep the community safe and informed of the resources available to them to deal with problems of drug abuse and unemployment. This session will show a mock notification meeting and give instructions on how to set them up in your community.

Work Retention: How to Stay On the Road to Success (Parasol I)

Incorporating Naturally-Occurring Social Support into Interventions with Former Prisoners with Substance Use Disorders: Findings from a Randomized Controlled Trial and Implications for Practice Workshop (Meeting Room 60)

- **Presenters:** *Carrie Pettus-Davis, Assistant Professor-Brown School-Washington University in St. Louis*
- **Description:** This workshop will review the program evaluation of a social support intervention, Support Matters. Support Matters combines effective cognitive behavioral substance abuse treatment approaches with the inclusion of naturally-occurring support providers in the program model. Using a randomized controlled trial design, the evaluation included an assessment of the feasibility of including naturally-occurring social support providers in cognitive-based reentry programming as well as an

examination of the effectiveness of such an approach in reducing substance abuse and criminal behavior. Challenges, strategies, and implications for practice will be collectively discussed by workshop attendees.

Measuring the Success of Your Community Partner Connections (Meeting Room 61)

- **Presenter:** *Anna Graf Williams, Ph.D., Senior Partner- Learnovation LLC*
- **Description:** This session focuses on taking in all the data from different community groups and partnerships, and then using the data with a risk, assess, assist model. Don't just report the data, but learn how to use it to determine challenges to partnerships, assess needs, and assist in providing solutions to partners and clients alike.

How Are Successful Community Partnerships Built? (Meeting Room 70)

- **Presenters:** *Daniel Rodriguez, Functional Unit Manager and Sabrina Doss, Corrections Classification Assistant-Western Reception Diagnostic Correctional Center*
- **Description:** How do you build a strong working relationship between the Missouri Department of Corrections (MDOC) and Community Services? The MDOC did this with MERS/Goodwill in Springfield, Mo. through the Prison Re-Entry Initiative (PRI) of Greene County. We will show you what steps were taken and to include a video presentation that documents real life success stories.

Giving Voice to Children of Incarcerated Parents (Meeting Room 71)

- **Presenter:** *Jackie Toben, Director-Let's Start (Roosevelt Roberts, Darolyn Cunningham and Jillian Palacios-young adults who have lived the experience of parental imprisonment)*
- **Description:** Children "on the outside" with a parent in prison face numerous challenges. Too often they grow up under a cloud of low expectations and live with the stigma and shame that come with this loss. Too often society dismisses these children as future liabilities while overlooking opportunities to address the pain and trauma with which these children struggle. However, it is by facing the trauma and stigma of parental incarceration head on that we can assist these children as they grow into our future parents and community leaders. During this session, stories of children who have lived the experience of parental imprisonment will be shared along with current research on the topic and recommended interventions.

Missouri's Innovative Reentry Court Programs (Meeting Room 72)

- **Presenter:** *Anne M. Dannerbeck Janku, Ph.D., Research Manager- Office of State Courts Administrator*
- **Description:** Missouri courts have developed reentry drug court programs for offenders who have served a 120 day prison sentence as well as for offenders who spend the first 60 days of their drug court program in a county jail. To evaluate the programs, we matched participants to similar offenders who would have been eligible for the programs but were released to the community before the programs began. During this session we will describe the programs, present the evaluation results, engage the audience in a discussion of how to use the results to improve programs, and describe how the evaluation findings were used to implement a new reentry program that is supported through a Second Chance Act grant.

National Farmworker Jobs Program (Meeting Room 73)

- **Presenter:** *Cheri Lewandowski, Casemanager-UMOS*
- **Description:** UMOs operates the National Farmworker Jobs Program (NFJP), WIA-167 with an array of services to farmworkers and their families throughout Wisconsin and Missouri. The purpose of the program is to enable people to help themselves improve their economic well being, their education, their health, and their housing so they may better realize their potential. While there are seasonal farmworkers who reside year round in Wisconsin and Missouri, most are underemployed.

Sustaining Grass Roots Efforts through Micro-Enterprises (Parasol I)

- **Presenter:** *Ch. Farris Robertson, Director-Recovery Chapel*
- **Description:** This presentation will cover the creation of business, even for a nonprofit, is legitimate and useful in creating a sustainable grass roots organization. While intense effort goes into creating such enterprises, the benefits are enormous and the prospects for longevity are good for such programs.

Medication Assisted Treatment Approaches for the Treatment of Substance Dependent Offenders (Parasol II)

- **Presenters:** *Stephen Doherty, M.Ed., LPC, CRADC, CCJP, Director-Eastern Missouri Corrections Division Gateway Foundation and Anita Salisbury, MBA, CRADC, MATS, Area Substance Abuse Treatment Coordinator-Missouri Department of Corrections*
- **Description:** This workshop is designed to introduce the basic concept of Medication Assisted Treatment for offenders. The workshop will include information regarding the history and elements of Medication Assisted Treatment, considered evidence based practice, the types of medications currently used, and why MAT is beneficial to avoid relapse to drug use and can assist in lowering recidivism.

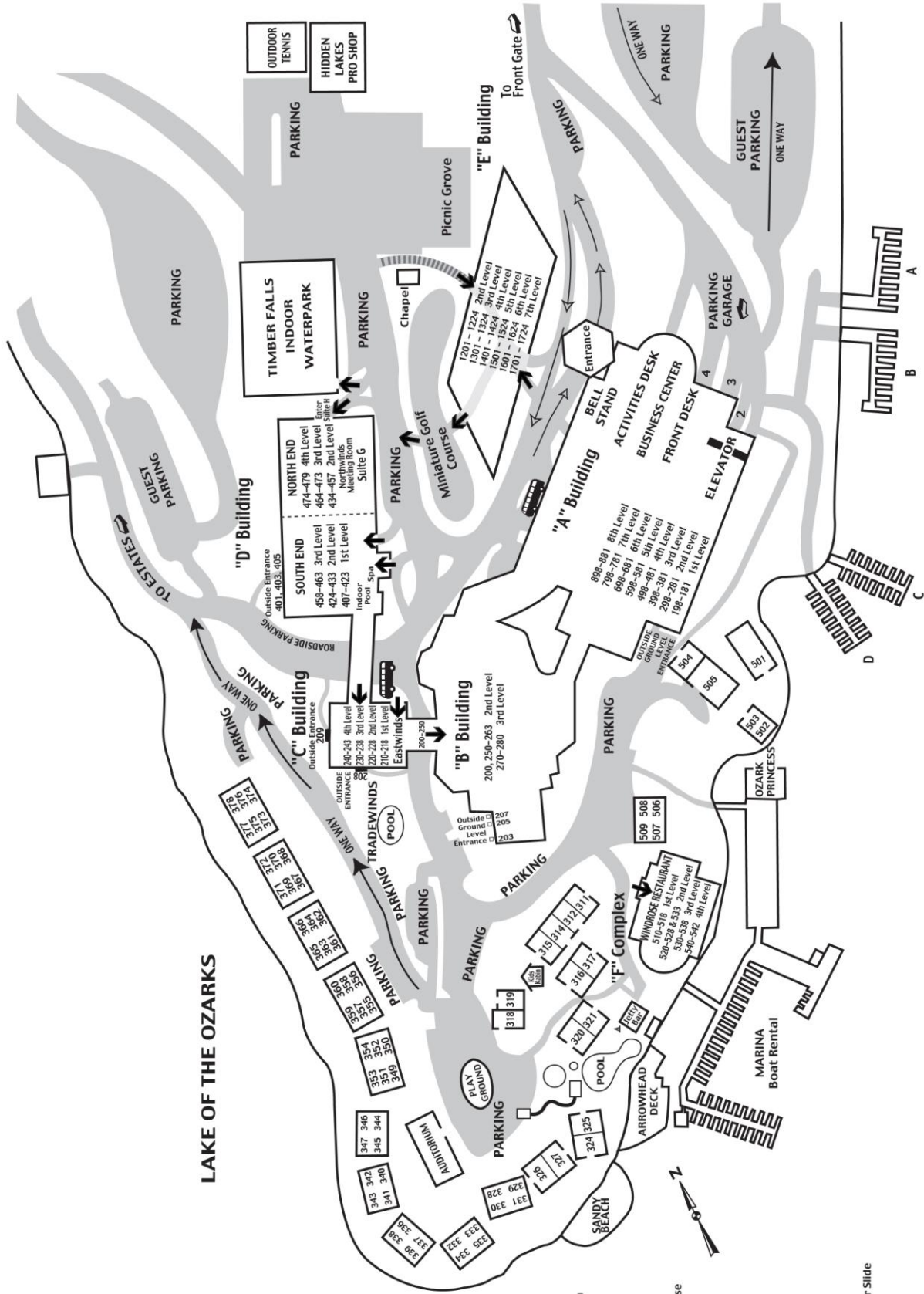

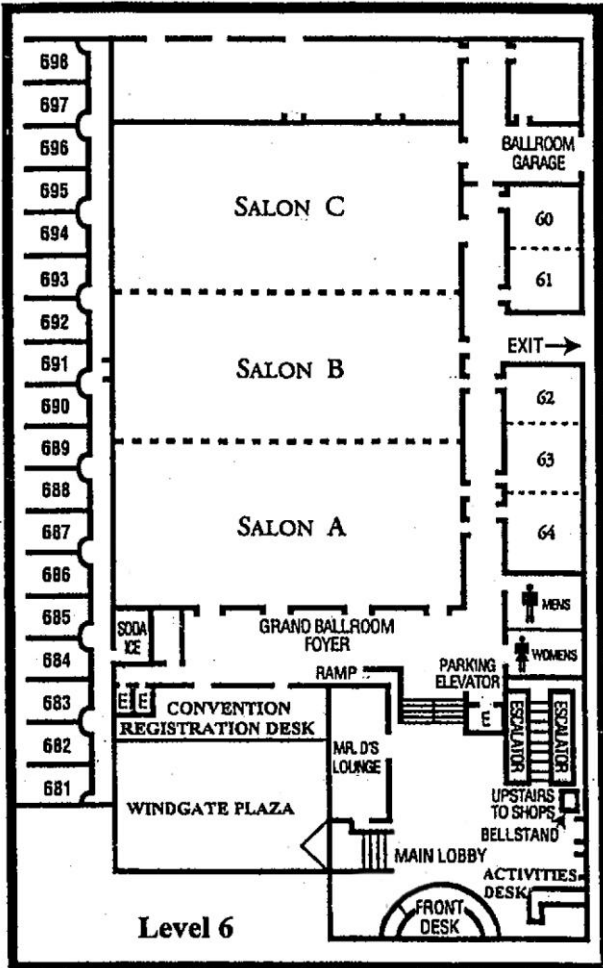

BUILDING A & B (Meeting and Facilities Directional Map)

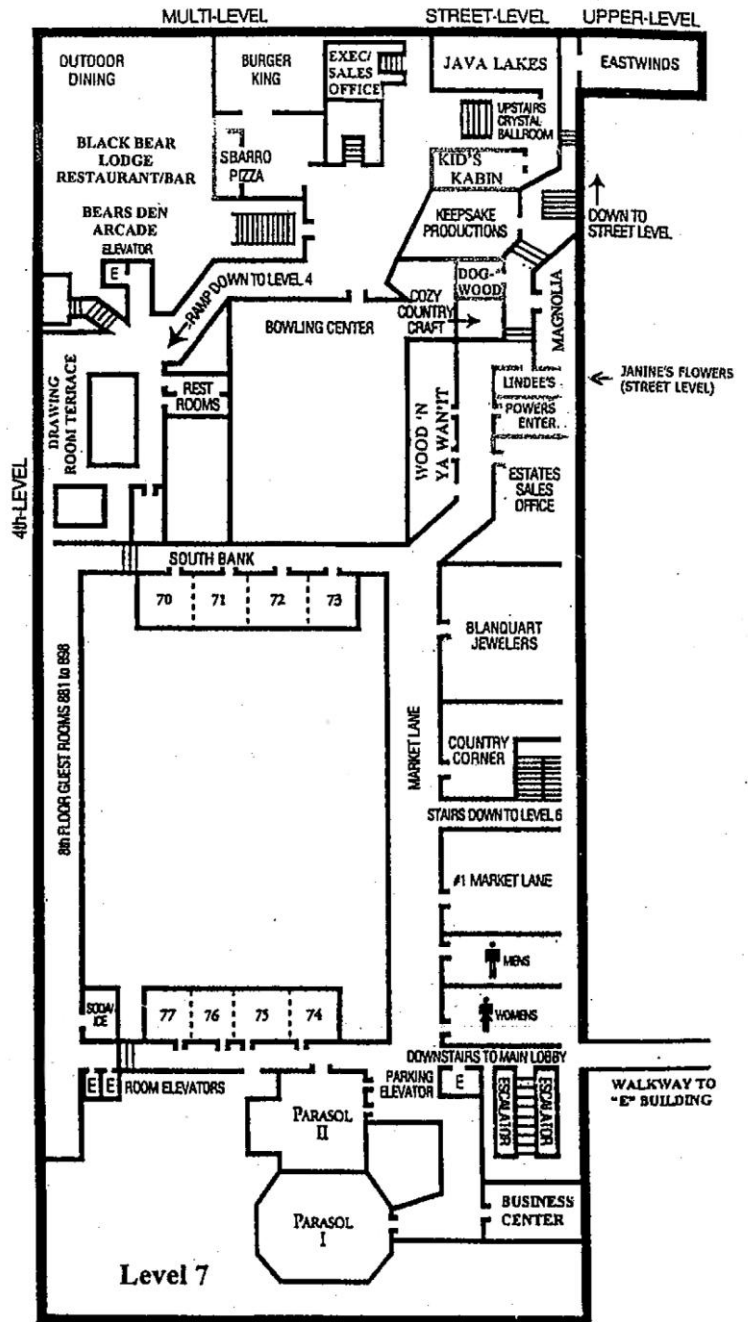


EASTWINDS: Go down Market Lane past all the shops, down two short flights of stairs to Keepsake Photography / "Old Tyme Photos" Studio, proceed around corner instead of down next flight of stairs and go straight ahead. Eastwinds is the room just up a short set of stairs on the right, in the corner.

DOGWOOD & MAGNOLIA ROOMS: Go down Market Lane past all the shops, down one short flight of stairs, the Magnolia Room is on your right and Dogwood Room will be on your left.

CRYSTAL BALLROOM: Go down Market Lane, past all shops, down three flights of stairs, to our Social Lobby. At the Social Lobby take the short flight of carpeted steps up to the Crystal Ballroom, which is on your left.

DRAWING ROOM TERRACE: Go down Market Lane past all the shops, down three flights of stairs, to our Social Lobby. At the Social Lobby, take the short flight of steps down, past the Bowling Alley and Black Bear Lodge Restaurant entrance and proceed down the ramp. At the end of the ramp, turn right and the Drawing Room Terrace is straight ahead.



NORTHWINDS AND SUITE G: Take the escalator from the Main Lobby up to the catwalk to Building E. Cross the catwalk to the 3rd level of Building E. Go left at Building E's main corridor and proceed out the side door into the stairwell where you will exit through the door on your left. Go across the road and into Building D, entering through the double glass doors on your left. These meeting rooms are in Building D, next door to each other.

AUDITORIUM: The Auditorium is a building on the waterfront. Proceed down our main road, toward the marina and Arrowhead Pool. When walking toward these areas, you will see our playground. To the right of the playground is the building that houses the Auditorium.
